Academic Calendar Course Description

Advanced theories in health and exercise psychology and their critical evaluation regarding utility for instilling and sustaining health behaviour change. Formerly offered as HMKN 421. Credit will be granted for only one of HES 332 or HMKN 421. [3-0-0]

Prerequisite: HES 330. Registration is limited to students in the Health Behavior Change Concentration in the B.H.E.S. Program.

Methods of Delivery

In lectures, we will use a variety of learning methods, including lectures, group discussions, case studies, the use of e-learning tools, and critical reflections. Experiential learning via behaviour change plans will also help students learn. Asynchronous materials will help students solidify lecture information and provide opportunities to practice.

Learning Outcomes

After completing this course, successful students will be able to:

- 1. Understand and explain common theories of behaviour change, the interconnectedness between them, and the amalgamation of theories into a practical model for intervention development.
- 2. Utilize course content to develop and execute a behaviour change plan within a specified timeframe.
- 3. Reflect on and relate behaviour change experiences to relevant theories and real-world applicability.

Weekly Engagement Activities

The purpose of these activities is to evaluate Learning Outcome 1. Throughout the semester, a total of 10 activities and practice questions will be posted on Canvas by the end of Friday each week (please see timeline provided below). The purpose of the activities is to review content covered in the previous week and provide students with the opportunity to practice critical thinking questions related to the course content. Each activity will be approximately 30-45 minutes in length. Completing the activity correctly will be worth 1% of the student's final grade. The activities will be available from Fridays until the **beginning of class on Wednesdays the following week**. More information about asynchronous content and procedures will be given in class.

Practical Lecture Activities

The purpose of these activities is to evaluate Learning Outcomes 1 & 3. Throughout the semester, experiential learning opportunities will be conducted on Fridays that are relevant to the theory of the week. These activities will vary in structure; all are designed to help students apply theory to real-life examples. Marks will be allocated as completion of each activity. More details will be provided at the beginning of each Friday lecture.

Assignment 1: Behaviour Change Plan Prep

The purpose of this assignment is to evaluate Learning Outcomes 2 & 3. As part of this course, you will work with an individual of your choice to help them change a specific behaviour over a one-month period. To prepare for your behaviour change plan, this assignment will help you determine key information to ensure a successful attempt at behaviour change, such as the specified target behaviour, the subject that will be executing the behaviour change plan, the timeframe in which the plan will be performed, communication plan, and the methods by which you will track plan progression. Further details and a rubric will be provided to students via Canvas.

Assignment 2: Theory & Plan Explanation

The purpose of this assignment is to evaluate Learning Outcomes 1 & 2. Now that you have chosen a theory covered in class to guide the development of your behaviour change plan, you will create an outline that summarizes your theory and includes the behaviour change techniques that will be implemented in the specified timeframe and their relevance to the chosen theory. This assignment will also include information regarding the mode of delivery and evaluation plan.

Following submission of this assignment, your subject is expected to try and implement your behaviour change plan, while you are expected to implement the specified tracking and evaluation plan. Further details and a rubric will be provided to students via Canvas.

Assignment 3: Behaviour Change Interview

The purpose of this assignment is to evaluate Learning Outcomes 1 & 3. Students will need to record a ~20-minute video interview with the subject who executed the behaviour change plan. As the interviewer, the student will focus the interview on the evaluation of the plan, barriers and facilitators encountered, and potential future modifications. The student's job is to relate the interviewee's answers to their chosen theory. Students are encouraged to be creative and have fun with this assignment while still covering the core components of their chosen theory. Further details and a rubric will be provided to students via Canvas.

Final Exam

The purpose of this written final exam is to evaluate Course Objectives 1 & 3. The written final exam will be completed in-person at a date during the specified final exam period (**April 11**th-**26**th). Students will have the duration of the period to complete this exam. The final exam is cumulative, meaning all material covered during the course will be included. More information about the final exam will be provided in class.



Class Policies

Attendance

Lecture attendance is highly recommended as material discussed in class will be the substance of assignments and exams. Students who attend lectures achieve higher grades. Class participation is encouraged and has also been found to lead to higher grades. The lecture slides and other resources will be available on Canvas, but it is impossible to duplicate the discussions, activities, challenges and interactions that take place in the classroom.

It is expected that assignments are submitted by the posted due date. The weekly activities are meant to bolster learning through repetition and will assist in participation during the following week's activities.
